Dear Parishioners of Our Lady of the Assumption,

Please God we're all okay, living with these re-imposed restrictions, in addition to the many safety measures in place, designed to see us through these extraordinary days, ...or should I say, months!

I'm writing to you on this occasion to inform you of an imminent change to my priestly responsibilities. On Thursday of this week (25th June) I received confirmation of my pending appointment as Parish Priest of St Agnes Highett, which formally commences on the 22nd July, 2020. This appointment will be in addition to my current appointment here as Parish Priest of OLA. Archbishop Comensoli's letter to all parishioners within both parish communities, which is included in this week's digital mail out, will provide you with important and greater detail. Suffice to say this will mean some change for all concerned. Our historical link to St Agnes' Parish as our mother parish, and the uncertainty the St Agnes community has lived with for just over twelve months, has meant that the partnership of our two parishes was within the realm of possibility, not least of all due to the shortage of priests. What was considered a possibility will now be our shared reality, and I hope and pray that I, along with your support and assistance, can continue to meet the pastoral, liturgical and administrative needs, as they present within both communities.

As this news is so fresh, there has been little time to address many of the logistics, however I hope that in the coming weeks, we can explore what may be possible alongside any changes that may be unavoidable. Mass timetabling, Sacramental celebrations, pastoral planning and finance meetings, school responsibilities, administration and maintenance, as well as the broader pastoral outreach to both communities, will undoubtedly require careful and sensitive consideration and consultation. We'll need to proceed gently, with wisdom and resolve. Much more will no doubt come to light in the days and weeks ahead, and so I ask that we pray for one another, asking both Mary, the Mother of God - Our Lady of the Assumption, and St Agnes to put a good word in for us and all concerned.

Do take care, and I again commend to you the Archbishop's letter, and ask for your prayerful support, particularly in this transitional time ahead.



Focus on the Readings...

To follow Jesus means putting other important relationships second. It means taking up the cross and perhaps facing the same fate that Jesus met persecution, suffering, death—but remaining faithful leads to eternal life. In ancient times, a person's agent was seen to be the person themselves, and here Jesus is giving great dignity to the apostolate of following him by saying it derives from the Father himself through Jesus. In the Scriptures, a prophet is a person who speaks for God. To be a prophet, one must have a very clear understanding of what God wants, and the task is to transmit that message to the people. There are many instances of the people rejecting the message of the prophets. Some scholars translate 'holy man' as 'just man' or someone who does the will of God. To recognise and welcome the truth is to be a disciple. The cost of discipleship may be high but the rewards are great.
